SOLDIER WITH A SECRET
ALBERT CASHER (JERRIE HODGERS) (1843-1875)

Born in Louth, Albert Casher emigrated to the United States of America just before the Civil War (1861-1865). Albert's contract was with the Union side, and he saw seven years' service.

IRISH VS IRISH
AMERICAN CIVIL WAR (1861-1865)

Irish soldiers fought on both sides in many battles. Around 20,000 Irish migrants joined the Confederate Army compared to around 145,000 in the Union Army, many joining one of the five regiments that made up its Irish brigades.
